Hamish McKeich is guest conductor, with the Auckland Philharmonia Orchestra, for


The song contest began in 1946 and was for many years known as the Lockwood Song

Overall winners in the men's and women's team sections were Wanganui Collegiate and Glendowie College respectively. Fifty teams of walkers also

entered the event.

Among the runners was Jemima Price, of Taupo, who celebrated her 37th birthday with her Event Junkies team

Copter plucks injured skiers from mountain after fall

A group of four skiers who took a wrong turn on Mt Ruapehu fell over a cliff and slid more than 200m before coming to a stop.

The group turned back due to bad weather when hiking to the summit, but while skiing down took a wrong turn and four of them fell down the cliff. The Taupo-based Greenlea Rescue Helicopter was dispatched to the Mangaehuehu Glacier on the

southern slopes of Mt Ruapehu on Saturday afternoon after the accident happened. Greenlea Rescue Helicopter pilot Nat Every said the helicopter picked up the three injured men from an altitude of about 2134m and took them to a local medical centre before flying two of them to Rotorua Hospital.

A third man was flown to Auckland's Middlemore Hospital with spinal injuries. The fourth man was uninjured. Mr Every said the incident

happened outside of the ski area, but the Mt Ruapehu ski patrol had done a fantastic job in attending the incident and providing initial treatment to the men until the helicopter arrived.

The men are believed to be from Auckland.
